# Testimony of Myanmar (Burma) Student at USA Seminary

I, Jacob Tubal, was born in a small village in Northwestern Myanmar (Burma). There was no electricity or transportation in my village, which is seven miles away from the nearest town. When it was necessary to go there for supplies such as soap, rice and other essentials which we could not raise or make at home, mother usually walked alone two to three hours to get there.

Corn was the main food although we also had homegrown pork and chicken occasionally, usually prepared with rice. Agriculture is the main occupation and excess vegetables, beans, cabbage and tomatoes, are taken to the town to sell.



Villagers make their living on small farms. Because the mountain is too steep for rice, corn and other vegetables are grown for food. Excess is carried to the distant city by foot and sold to buy such staples as salt, sugar and basic medical supplies.

God blessed me with strict, loving parents who, when I was still young, took me, along with my siblings, to church every Sunday. Although about 89% of Burmese people are Buddhists, there are none in our area. Most of the two hundred or more villagers attended one of three Baptist churches. To my parents, to miss one church service was inexcusable. However, being born in a strict Christian family and going to Church regularly did not make me a believer.

Taking care of six children was not an easy task for my parents; besides, education was low in my village and surrounding villages. Moreover, more money was needed for my education, which created a great hardship for my parents. Therefore, at the age of ten, I had to leave my home and my parents for a better edu-

cation. I was raised at a children's home in Yangon where my conversion took place at age eleven under the teaching of

Ms. Rhoda who works at the Children's Home. Since my conversion, I have had a desire to know the Bible more; therefore, when I finished high school, I enrolled in Bible College (Biblical School of Theology) in Yangon, Myanmar.

After I finished college, it was my desire to continue my study somewhere abroad. The "where" was unknown for the whole summer until Dr. Bill Johnson and his friends visited Myanmar in July 2013. Then, God, through Dr. Bill Johnson, and his friends, opened the door of my education in USA. I am looking forward to finishing my study in the coming semester, God willing. My study here in the United States happens because of the help of ICP and some other churches. I am filled with joy whenever I think about being a part of ICP in the future to help children learn about God and help them grow in the knowledge of Christ (2 Peter 3:18).

Note: Jacob will earn his Master's degree in May 2016. He plans to continue to earn a second Master's degree in May 2017, then he will return to Myanmar to begin working with ICP to provide materials for the churches. He will be well qualified to translate the Bible and to write children's Bible study literature.
