NEW SCHOOL FOR MILK FEEDING IN PHILIPPINES

There are a total of 262 students in the Mangold elementary School in a very poor district of the city of San Fernando. At the request of acting principal Lilibeth David and with the help of churches like Pleasant Way Baptist Church Naylor, Georgia and Tuscanooga Baptist Church, Groveland, Florida, ICP has begun a milk feeding program. The program aims to provide one glass of powdered milk and a small bun with peanut butter each day for those students who are diagnosed as being undernourished. This includes all the students of this school.

The milk feeding ministry and the pillow case dress ministry has helped open doors to the schools providing opportunity to teach thousands of children about salvation in Christ Jesus. Many of these have been saved, baptized and are active members of the Amazing Grace Baptist Church.

HMONG LANGUAGE BOOKS DISTRIBUTED IN TEXARKANA

The lady at the farmer's market was excited to learn that I had been to Southeast Asia and knew about her people there. She and her husband came here several years ago and established a small organic farm just south of Texarkana. When I asked her if she would like to go back to her homeland, her expression turned dark. "No," she said, "there is nothing there for me to return to." Mai Her came with her husband, Pastor Kaua Thao who serves a small Baptist church about thirty-five miles north of Texarkana, Arkansas. The church is attended by immigrants from Laos, Burma and Thailand.

She was excited that I had some books in her native tongue and in the Thai language, a second language for her. The Thai language books were translated from an Bible study book written by Dr. Ray McAlister and the Mong language tracts were translated by M. D. Prevost from California and printed by Brother Herman Strickland in Florida. These books gave the church a fresh look at Bible study in their native language.

There are many communities of immigrants from Southeast Asia in various areas of our nation. ICP have recently helped a church in Clarksville, Arkansas provide books for some of the Karen Hill
